1. Summary

Please summarise the key findings of the EINA.

The provision will connect new and existing communities at the heart of Nine Elms, creating a sense of place through a flagship school and community facilities. It will support an integrated neighbourhood, foster community cohesion and provide access to high-quality facilities.

Expressions of interest were invited from local schools who admit high numbers of children and families from the catchment area for operating the primary school site. St George's Church of England school was successful by demonstrating a strong reputation in the community. St George's Primary School's ethos aligns with a community provision ensuring both the school and the community are working together to support children and families in the area.

St. George's pride themselves on being an inclusive school, being especially proud of their work with pupils with Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) needs and have created a safe, nurturing environment where all children are known, loved and valued.

The addition of a base for 16 children with special needs supports meets our ambition to promote inclusion in Wandsworth and a school for all. The SEND base will have places for 16 children, all with SEMH. These children are currently having to be placed in independent provision.

The data below shows that out of 42,292 pupils in Wandsworth schools, 4,492 are recorded as having SEN support, with 3,009 active EHCPs. In terms of deprivation, an estimated 35,526 people experience income deprivation in Wandsworth, which includes an estimated 8,544 children. In terms of health, 58.8% of children and young people are estimated to be physically active, compared to 45.7% in London and 47% in England.

This EINA has shown that no significant adverse impacts have been identified for individuals and groups with protected characteristics. Instead, this new provision will strengthen provision for our children and families and wider community.

The population of Nine Elms ward in 2024 stands at 3214 residents with an increase projected to 4035 residents in 2026 when the school is targeted to be open (GLA Population Projections of 2024, 2026) This increase highlights a need for this provision providing residents with a mainstream school and community facility.

Disability

The ONS Census (2021) showed that 37,447 (i.e. 11.4% of all residents) were disabled with 7.7% (415 residents) in the Nine Elms ward under the Equality Act across Wandsworth.

From the May 2024 School Census, St George's CoE Primary had 235 pupils.

Out of 42,292 pupils in Wandsworth schools, 4,492 are recorded as having SEN Support (School Census, Jan 2024). In addition, resident data shows 3,009 active Education, Health & Care Plans (EHCPs).

6.2% of our school populations (i.e. our population in schools, not resident population) has an EHCP (8th highest nationally), compared to 4.8% nationally and for statistical neighbours. However, this is heavily impacted by our status as a large net importer of Special School students. Our overall SEN Support population is 14.4% (51st highest nationally), compared to 13.6% nationally and 13.8% for statistical neighbours.



This data shows that Wandsworth has a higher proportion of pupils receiving SEN Support compared to London and England in each setting (excluding special schools). The largest cohort receiving SEN support is at nursery school (21.7% compared to 20.1% in London and 17% in England).

The SEND base at the school will have places for 16 children, all with Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) needs. This is a key area of SEND need which has been identified post COVID and through our recent SEMH review. We have established a considerable number of bases to cater for children with autism but there is currently not enough SEMH provision. These children are currently having to be placed in independent provision.


The graph below highlights the majority of SEN primary need at St George's is Social, Emotional and Mental Health).

The ONS Census (2021) data showed that 2251 residents (41.7%) of all Nine Elms residents were from a Black, Asian or Minority Ethnic background compared to 32.19% against the borough's population. This project will support an integrated neighbourhood, foster community cohesion and provide access to high-quality facilities to all within the borough.

Ethnicity breakdown of St George's school is below (January 2024 school census). This graph shows the majority of pupils 41.7% have a Black or Black British background.

41.5% of Nine Elms residents identify as having no religion compared to 36.2% of the borough and 33% of residents are Christian compared to 42.65% of the borough (ONS Census Data, 2021).

St Geroge's is a Church of England school however, they will ensure their current community is protected within their admissions policy and have proposed a 'priority area' arrangement like many of the Wandsworth schools to ensure residents from the estate, who will be losing their local school distance-wise, have priority within the criteria. They would also propose a criteria for disadvantaged pupils to ensure they could continue to support those most vulnerable in the community, maintaining a high level of FSM eligible children in the school.

Sexual orientation

The ONS Census (2021) data shows that 86.5% of Wandsworth residents identified as Straight or Heterosexual, and 5.2% identified as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual or Other. This question was only asked of respondents over 16.

Deprivation

On the ONS's deprivation measures, Wandsworth is the 3rd least deprived borough in London.

Using the 2019 Indices of Deprivation and the ONS Census 2021 data, an estimated 35,526 people experience income deprivation across Wandsworth.

Deprivation (measured by the **2019 English Indices** of Deprivation)

At a regional level, Queenstown (which Nine Elms was previously a part of until 2022) had the most LSOAs ranked as relatively more deprived (2019 Indices of Deprivation).

Low-income groups & employment

An estimated 8,544 children are living in deprivation across Wandsworth.

Carers

In Wandsworth Schools there is an increase in proportion of children who are eligible for free school meals. In January 2024, 30% of Wandsworth pupils were eligible for free school meals, an increase from 16% in 2018. This is higher than London averages (28%) and England (26%) (2019 IMD).

Care experienced people

> Most of the children attending St George's CoE Primary School are from the 10% most deprived IDACI banding (149/235 - 63%) or 10-40% most deprived (76/149) (May 2024, School Census).

Single parents

As of May 2024, 147 out of 235 (63%) of pupils were eligible for free school meals (May 2024 School Census)

In December 2023, 83.9% Wandsworth residents were employed compared to 74.6% in London and 76% in England. Data shows that in July 2024, 3.9% of Wandsworth residents were claiming out-of-work benefits compared to 5.9% in London and 4.3% in England.

Carers

An estimated 5.8% of Wandsworth residents are unpaid carers. The Adult Social Care Outcomes Framework (ASCOF) showed that in 2021/22, only 32.1% of adult carers felt they had as much social contact as they would like.

Only 0.1% of the Wandsworth school population are known to be young carers, compared to 0.3% in London and 0.6% nationally.

Care Experienced People

We currently have 233 children looked after with the figure generally decreasing over the past 8 years. The cohort is generally older, with 74% aged between 10 and 17, and 54% teenagers. In terms of ethnicity, 31% are from a Mixed Ethnic background, 30% are from a Black / Black British background, and 25% from a White / White British background. We have 328 people who have left care, 71% of which are aged between 18 and 21. 42% are from a Black / Black British background, and 25% are from a White / White British background.

Single Parents

6% of households in Wandsworth are lone parent households with dependent children, however this is lower than regional and national averages.

Health Inequalities

In 2022/23, Sports England reported that 58.8% of children and young people in Wandsworth are estimated to be physically active, compared to 45.7% in London and 47% in England. In this case, physically active means at least 60 minutes of moderate-vigorous intensity activity per day across the week.

With the new provision, soft landscaping and courtyard wildlife gardens are planned for outdoor play and lesson space, to encourage and support the children with physical activity. The community centre will house an indoor sports hall and outdoor Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) for 5-a-side football, netball and other outdoor activities, both of which are in high demand across the Borough.

Refugee Status

In March 2023, 11% of the looked after children population are unaccompanied asylum-seeking children (26 individuals) and the majority of looked after children are 10+ years (69%) which is linked to a particularly high level of need for this age group (Department for Education, 2023).
