SUMMARY

Please summarise the key findings of the EINA.

Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) Services in Wandsworth have been on an improvement journey since our local area inspection in November 2019. Our aim is to create a strategic plan (SEND Strategy) and a clear vision for SEND that is understood by all, including families and partners. There are 2,418 children and young people in the resident population who have Education Health and Care (EHC) plans. In addition, the school population in Wandsworth shows 4,480 children and young people have SEN support.

Working in partnership under the SEND Joint Strategic Partnership Board, the local authority, South West London Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and our parents group Positive Parents Action (PPA), have developed a strong vision -

We want Wandsworth to be a place where children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities are everyone's priority and feel like they belong. Their education, health and care needs will be identified early, met timely and efficiently, and they will be supported to achieve the best possible outcomes.

We are as ambitious for our children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities as those without. Having a special educational need and/or disability should not limit aspirations.

The strategy provides an overarching vision and strategic focus for our continued improvement journey. Our action plan sets out the actions we will take on our transformation journey. This will help us measure the difference we are making to the lives of children and young people with SEND.

The outcome of the EINA shows that there are no significant adverse outcomes for individuals and groups under the protected characteristics. Change management will be key to ensure mitigation of any perceived negative outcomes, given that the proposed strategy looks instead to positively contribute to the lives of children and young people with disabilities. This will be equally between males and females who have SEN provision, and will monitor other protected characteristics with consideration given to targeted action

if a protected characteristic group shows an increase in representation of children and young people with SEN provision.

1. Background

Briefly describe the service/policy or function:

The Wandsworth Local Area SEND Strategy provides the strategic focus and framework as part on a continued improvement journey following the November 2019 local area inspection. The strategy aims to improve the lives of children and young people with SEND based on five outcomes we want to see for all children and young people in the borough, as featured in the Wandsworth Children and Young People's Services Plan 2020-23. These are the areas of children and young people's lives we are committed to improving –

- 1. Safe & Secure
- 2. Achieve & Aspire
- 3. Healthy Mind, Healthy Body
- 4. Respected & Involved
- 5. Prepared for Adulthood

To ensure that each of the 5 out comes are met, operational activities and services will be accountable to one of seven transformational subgroups, who in turn will report to the SEND Strategic Partnership Board. The seven themed subgroups are —

- 1. Local Offer
- 2. Preparation for Adulthood
- 3. Joint Commissioning
- 4. SEND monitoring
- 5. SEN support
- 6. ASD
- 7. Early Years
