1. Summary

Please summarise the key findings of the EINA.

Play is crucial for both children and adults in healthy development, well-being, and relationship building. Through play, children can explore their surroundings, develop problem-solving skills and enhance their creativity. Play means children can have fun, be themselves, learn, develop, and make friends. Play also strengthens the bonds between both families and communities.

In recent years, the opportunities for play have diminished. The pandemic caused children and families to lose access to spaces and opportunities for play and socialising for extended periods of time. The cost-of-living crisis has also had a major impact, with many families unable to afford travel and/or costly activities.

We want to put play at the top of everyone's agenda. We want Wandsworth to be the best place to grow up, a place where everyone values play as a life-enriching experience for all our children and young people. We want to raise awareness about its importance, working with our partners to ensure every child in the borough has access to exciting and inclusive play opportunities in their local area. We will make 2025 the year of play.

We will focus on three key areas to ensure that Wandsworth is the best place for play: People at Play, Communities at Play and Environments for Play. As part of this, we will invest in our play spaces, expand our free and low-cost play provision, and drive forward ambitious schemes such as 'baby boxes' for young and care experienced parents.

The data below shows that there is a high proportion of people in Wandsworth from Black, Asian, or Minority Ethnic backgrounds (34.1%) compared to England (25.3%), though this is lower than London (48.7%). In addition, 11.4% of residents are disabled under the Equality Act, and out of 42,292 pupils in Wandsworth schools, 4,492 are recorded as having SEN support, with 3,009 active EHCPs. In terms of deprivation, an estimated 35,526 people experience income deprivation in Wandsworth, which includes an estimated 8,544 children. Roehampton ward is the most deprived for both residents and children, as well as having the highest number of disabled residents.

In terms of health, 58.8% of children and young people are estimated to be physically active, compared to 45.7% in London and 47% in England. The data also shows that children are more likely to become overweight as they get older – 19.2% of Wandsworth children in Reception are overweight, compared to 34.8% in Year 6. For adults, 49.5% of Wandsworth residents are classified as overweight or obese, whereas 79% are estimated to be physically active.

This EINA has shown that no significant adverse impacts have been identified for individuals and groups with protected characteristics. Instead, the new play approach will strengthen play opportunities, particularly focussing on free and low-cost provision, as well as improving play spaces to include more age-specific and inclusive facilities.

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Disability	<p>The ONS Census (2021) showed that 37,447 (i.e. 11.4% of all residents) were disabled under the Equality Act across Wandsworth. By ward, the most populated areas for this resident group are Roehampton (3,065), Furzedown (2,390) and West Hill (2,270).</p> <p>Out of 42,292 pupils in Wandsworth schools, 4,492 are recorded as having SEN Support (School Census, Jan 2024). In addition, resident data shows 3,009 active Education, Health & Care Plans (EHCPs).</p> <p>6.2% of our school populations (i.e. our population in schools, not resident population) has an EHCP (8th highest nationally), compared to 4.8% nationally and for stat neighbours. However, this is heavily impacted by our status as a large net importer of Special School students. 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Pregnancy and maternity	<p>The ONS Census (2021) data showed that the birth rate was 44.5 per 1,000 females aged 15 to 44 years, compared to 54.3 per 1,000 females in England. This equates to roughly 4,000 live births in Wandsworth a year. This figure has been declining steadily over the past decade – in 2012, the birth rate was 59.8 in Wandsworth and 64.9 in England.</p> <p>The census data also showed that the rate of multiple births was 16.9 per 1,000. The cohort is generally older, with 74% aged between 10 and 17, and 54% teenagers.
